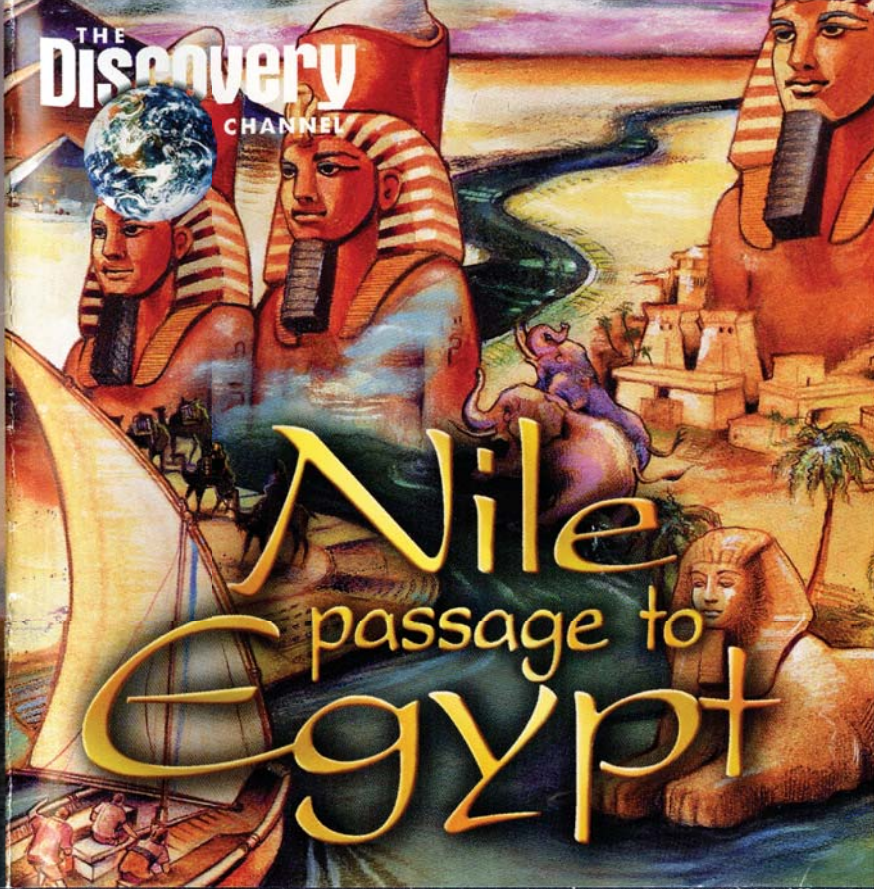

You will climb aboard your felucca, a traditional Nile sailing vessel, as we explore a world still rich in ancient architecture, art and people. If you'd like, we will even take time out to play some adventurous and challenging games along the way!

As our journey begins, I will show you how to use the camera, journal, map and other helpful tools you will find in your felucca. I will also explain how to navigate your felucca along thousands of miles of the Nile.

In this guide, I have written hints, tips and reminders that I hope you will find helpful along the way.

Installation for Windows

1. Start Microsoft Windows.
2. Place the NILE: PASSAGE TO EGYPT disc in the CD-ROM drive (using a disc caddy if appropriate).
3. From the Program Manager menu, select File, then choose Run.
4. At the Command Line, type: D:\SETUPEXE as shown. (If your CD-ROM drive is other than drive "D:," enter the appropriate drive letter.)
5. Choose OK, and follow the instructions provided on the screen.

IMPORTANT NOTE: The recommended "Full Hard Disk Installation" option, requires about 4.5 megabytes of disk space, will automatically save your journals on the hard disk, and allow NILE: PASSAGE TO EGYPT to run faster than if the "Partial Installation" option is selected. If you like, you can install QuickTime version 2.0.1 for Windows. This program is required to run NILE: PASSAGE TO EGYPT. To ensure best results, choose "Yes" to install this version of QuickTime for Windows.

Starting Nile: Passage to Egypt


1. Start Microsoft Windows.
2. Place the NILE: PASSAGE TO EGYPT disc in the CD-ROM drive.
3.  Open the Discovery Multimedia program group, and choose the NILE: PASSAGE TO EGYPT icon.

Installation For Apple Macintosh

1. Insert the NILE: PASSAGE TO EGYPT disc into the CD-ROM drive (using a disc caddy if appropriate).
2. Double-click the NILE icon on your desktop.
3. Drag the folder "Copy to HD" from the NILE disc to your desktop or hard disk. You may also want to rename the folder — for example, "Nile."


Starting Nile: Passage to Egypt

1. Place the NILE: PASSAGE TO EGYPT disc in the CD-ROM drive.
2.  Open the "Copy to HD" folder (or "Nile" folder, if you renamed it during installation), then double-click the NILE icon.

IMPORTANT NOTE: You can run NILE: PASSAGE TO EGYPT directly from the CD-ROM provided that QuickTime 2.0, Apple Multimedia Tuner 2.0.1 and Sound Manager 3.0 have been installed, however you will not be able to save your journal.

Navigating and Exploring the Nile

At all points along the Nile, you will want to enjoy the view in all directions. The compass shows you which direction your felucca is facing. As you move your cursor to the left side of the screen, it changes to a left hand.  Clicking once will turn your felucca to the left. As you move your cursor to the right side of the screen, it changes to a right hand. Clicking once will turn your felucca to the right. Keep clicking in either direction and you'll see a 360° panoramic view.

As you move your cursor up river or down river, it changes to a forward

pointing hand. Clicking once will take you forward to your next destination. (To return to a previous location, turn your felucca around with the left or right hand cursors so the compass reads "South," and then click with the forward pointing hand to proceed to your destination.)

Selecting Topics of Interest

You will want to explore the shores of each scene with your cursor. As you do, "hot" items will sparkle to indicate there are stories about them.

Sparkle Items

As you roll your cursor over items along the shore or in the water, they will sparkle.



Map

Shows you the entire Nile river and lets you change locations.

Media Player

Contains the articles, graphics, and video about the subjects of your journey.

Help Lantern

Provides help whenever you need it.



Quit

Will quit your journey on the Nile.

Camera

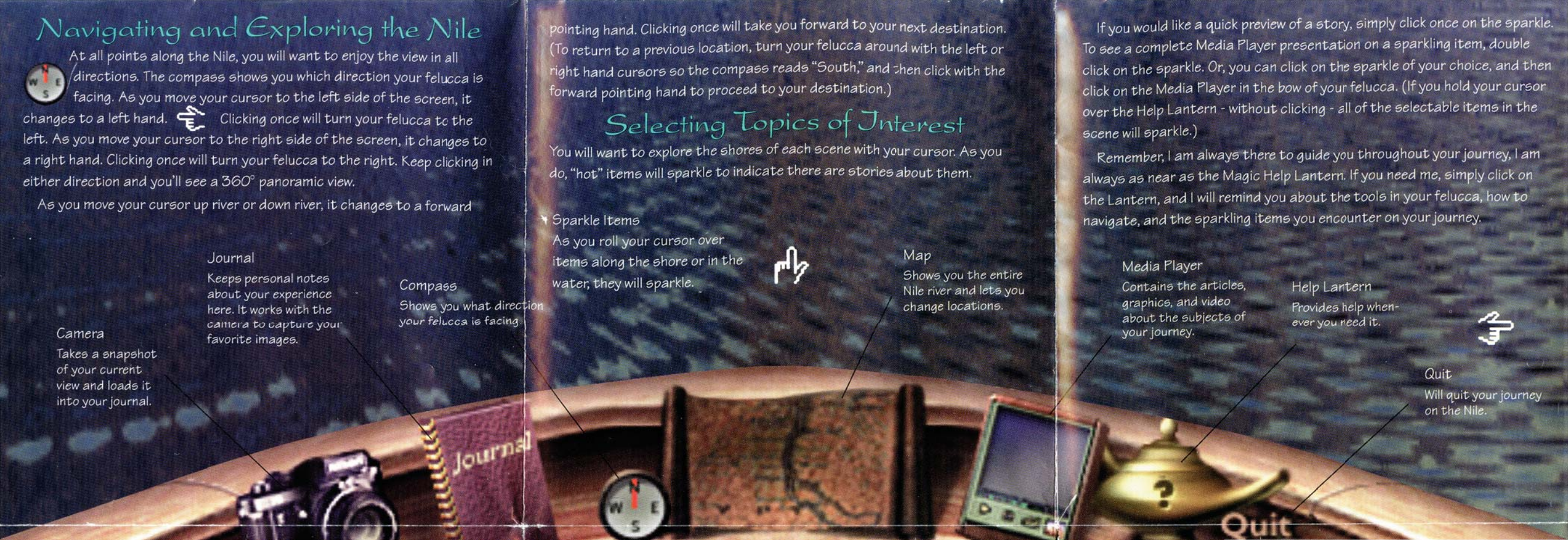
Takes a snapshot of your current view and loads it into your journal.

Journal

Keeps personal notes about your experience here. It works with the camera to capture your favorite images.

Compass

Shows you what direction your felucca is facing.

You can easily scroll along the map of the Nile. Simply click and drag the slider to move the detail view of the map.

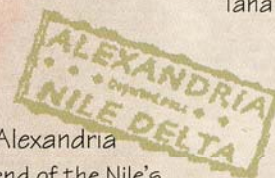

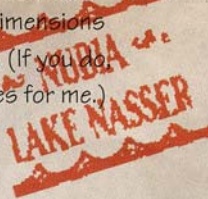
Between Luxor and Cairo the Nile winds through an ancient capital city, and Dendera. In ancient times, why were people mummified?



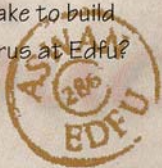
Map Destinations

Aswan marks the point at which you could actually navigate the Nile all the way to the Mediterranean Sea. How long did it take to build the Temple of Horus at Edfu?



The Sudan is a harsh land of swamp and desert. What large animal you will see here was once found all along the Nile? (During the heat of the day, you will find them munching on water lilies and other water plants.)
